






Light Patrol



I was so shocked and amazed when we were out on the streets, seeing just how involved and sincere the team was with those experiencing homelessness in downtown Toronto. Light Patrol's RV stops at major intersections—places I visit consistently—and not once do I remember seeing the big red RV. Maybe our paths have truly never crossed before, but it just really got me thinking. Another thing these kids taught me how to do was dance. Man, those kids can move! Uxbridge

I was excited to visit Dave Burridge's farm solely for the archery, but little did I know I would be challenged to ask myself key questions about my future. After each shot along his archery course, Dave asked the group questions about our goals: What they were and how we planned to achieve them. For the first couple questions I didn't think anything of it, but by the third I began to understand the parallels between archery and personal goals. If you have yet to put the two together allow me to help you out. In archery, you are taught to set your stance, identify the target, put yourself in the position to shoot, and release. You are putting the arrow in the best position to hit the target. Now let's look at goal setting: You step back, clearly identify what you want, put yourself in a position to succeed and then let God do the rest. Whether these questions were intentional or not, I found it refreshing to refocus myself and remember to let God's truth guide my arrow.


